PLEASE READ**

GENERAL RULES FOR FFA

1. All entries in this division must be from Home Projects carried on as a part of the regular high school Agriculture Science and Technology Program and FFA. Members may compete in the department for three years after graduation or until they are 21, except they can sell a market animal no later than the sale following their high school graduation.
2. Entry application must be made for beef, sheep, sheep shearing, swine, dairy cattle, horses, goats, rabbits and poultry on the FFA Entry Form available from advisors and must be submitted to Mark Hopfer, Days Creek, no later than July 1, 2011.
3. Entry forms for crops, wool and agricultural mechanics are due on entry day (Monday) of the Fair.
4. In case there is no competition, or entries are deemed unworthy of premiums offered, the premiums will be awarded according to the discretion of the judges. Champion of the breed will be awarded in each division at the discretion of the judge.
5. No exhibitor enrolled in both FFA and 4-H Club work will be permitted to enter the same animal in 4-H, FFA, or Open Class.
6. All FFA exhibits must be in place by 7:00 p.m. Monday, August 8, (except crops by 3:00 p.m. and swine by 3:30 p.m.) on Monday, August 8; and poultry and rabbits from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Monday, August 8.
7. Each FFA livestock exhibitor is required to exhibit their animal in the showmanship contest in each division in which they have an animal entered. No chapter entered animals will be entered in showmanship unless a chapter member is a chapter manager and his records, business agreement, and diary show this, then this member can show chapter animal in showmanship.
8. All FFA livestock exhibitors are automatically in the herdsmanship contest in each division in which they have an animal entered.
9. Exhibitors will be allowed two entries in each livestock class, two in each wool class, two entries in each farm

mechanics class, and one showmanship entry in each livestock division. Members having two entries in a specific livestock class may have the second animal shown by another FFA member. Each member may designate one market animal for the livestock auction. The designation must be made before the animals are weighed.

10. Each exhibitor will be personally responsible for having their exhibit in the ring or other proper place designated when the class is called for, the exhibit to be judged or sold. It is their responsibility to familiarize themselves with the class name and number of each entry he/she intends to show. If he/she does not have the entry in the proper place at the proper time for judging, the entry will not be allowed to compete.
11. Dress - All FFA exhibitors will be required to wear appropriate clothing while exhibiting their entries and at the awards ceremony. This attire would include, but not be limited to, the following items:
 - An FFA jacket light colored, or white shirt and FFA ties for boys
 - FFA jacket, white or light colored blouse and FFA skirt for girls.
 - Black Jeans, trousers or pants.
 - All items should be clean and worn in good taste.
12. The Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent and Department Superintendent have the authority to make any decisions necessary on questions of interpretations on rules of that department.
13. The County Fair Board and FFA advisors shall make all interpretations on rules in this department.
14. The local chapters have the right to enforce additional requirements.
15. All FFA exhibitors, in order to exhibit in their division, must be under the direct supervision of their Vo-Ag classroom instructor/FFA advisor.

DIVISION 2200: Herdsmanship Contest

The herdsmanship contest is conducted on a chapter basis.
All FFA livestock exhibits are automatically entered.

A. Cooperative Effort of Members - 25 points

1. Neat appearance
2. Monitors on duty regularly
3. Willingness to follow regulations
4. Conduct

B. Animals - 40 points

1. Animals tied and penned for best effect
 - Neck ropes are required on all beef and dairy animals (except for nursing calves)
 - Hog pens are wired on all four corners and gates are wired top and bottom
2. Animals well cared for
 - Animals kept clean at all times
 - Animals properly bedded
 - Blankets used properly

C. Barns - 35 points

6. Exhibit cards neatly arranged (all market animals must have Market Animal Cards displayed)
7. Equipment kept in proper places and in a safe manner
8. Feed kept in feed aisles, not on top of pens
9. Aisles kept clean, free for spectators
10. Stalls and pens kept clean, dry, stripped and re-bedded daily

Total - 100 points

Awards presented to the top chapter exhibiting beef, sheep, dairy, rabbits, goat, poultry, and swine. Awards are made available by the Douglas County Fair.

PREMIER LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

The purpose of this award is to encourage FFA members to raise and show quality breeding stock. This award will be given to the individual FFA member that has the best breeding exhibit in beef, sheep, swine, goat, rabbit, poultry and dairy cattle. A FFA member to be eligible for this award must show two or more breeding animals, show good citizenship, do a good job on herdsmanship, and do a good job on showmanship. All animals must be clean and properly fit to be eligible. The Division Superintendent will have the responsibility of determining which animals qualify. The winner will be selected on a total point basis as follows:

The Western States Angus Auxiliary, 13106 Reiner Road, Monroe, WA, 98272, provides an award to the outstanding FFA Angus exhibitor. The judge of the Junior Beef Show will be asked to make the selection of the winner based on show ring placing of individual animals and placing in showmanship. The following point system must be followed:

- Conformation placing - 50 points
- Grand Champion - 30 points
- Reserve Champion Showmanship placing - 25 points
- First - 15 points
- Second - 10 points
- Third - 6 points if participated in showmanship

American system 1st, 2nd, 3rd; Danish system 1st-Blue; 2nd-blue; 3rd-blue. If steers and breeding animals are both exhibited, points may be combined to select a winner. This is open to exhibitors with one or more breeding and/or market animals. The winning of the Auxiliary award in previous years shall not exclude an exhibitor from winning it again.

For market steers this award should go to the highest placing predominately black steer with Angus parentage, 50 points. It must be kept in mind that the purpose of this award is the promotion of the Angus breed.

The Oregon Simmental Association grade evaluation. will be continuing their 4-H/FFA awards program of past years. Once again there will be an award presented to the exhibitor of the Champion or Grand Champion, as the case may be, Simmental female, and a belt buckle presented to the exhibitor of the Champion steer carcass provided it was sired by a registered Simmental bull and the carcass contest includes:

Carcass hogs will weigh in on Monday, Aug 8th with the regular Market hogs. The Carcass hog show will take place on Tuesday, Aug 9th and all hogs will leave the fairgrounds by 7:00 a.m. on Wednesday, August 10th. Exhibitors will provide the following information at the time of the carcass hog show:

- Class 19: Pen of 3 feeder hogs
- Class 20: Carcass hogs
 1. Must weigh 210-285 lbs. (will be followed)
 2. Cannot be shown in another class.
 3. Will be judged on a combination of ring placing and carcass quality.
 4. Animal will be removed Tuesday, Aug. 9, after it is shown for slaughter
 5. Animals will be slaughtered and carcass will be split between the 12th and 13th rib for judging purposes.
 6. Animals must be weighed & tagged at the official Market Hogs weigh in.
 7. Student is required to find their own buyer.

CARCASSHOG POINT SYSTEM:

1. **Live placing:** 1st, 30 pts; 2nd, 28 pts; 3rd, 26 pts; 4th,

- 24 pts; 5th, 22 pts; etc.
- Average Daily Gain** - (Fair weight minus spring weight divided by number of days) Highest gaining hog receives 70 pts. For each .1 pounds ADG less 3 points will be deducted. Example: 1.8=70 points; 1.7=67 points; 1.6=64 points; 1.5=61 points, etc.
 - Backfat** - Hogs will be measured at the 10th rib. All hogs with .6—.8 bf will receive 40 points. For each .1 above .8 or below .6, 5 points will be deducted.
 - Loin Eye Area:** Largest loin eye=30 pts, all others deduct one point per 0.1 square inches smaller.
 - Carcass Grade:** US No. 1 = 30 points, U.S. No. 2 = 20 points; U.S. No. 3 = 10 points.
 - Ties will be broken in the order as follows:
 - 1st tie breaker will be ADG
 - 2nd tie breaker will be BF
 - 3rd tie breaker will be LEA

No use of talcum powders, oils, or other artificial coating materials will be allowed when fitting or showing animals in all swine classes.
